VOLUNTEERS HONORED

OUTSTANDING SERVICE AWARDS were given to Joanna Frawley and Barbara Burke at the September potluck and general meeting for their time, energy and leadership given to Morro Coast Audubon over many years.

The **AUDUBON ACTIVIST AWARD** was given to Marla Morrissey our Conservation Chair for her endless contributions and especially her efforts toward the protection of the Western Snowy Plover and in particular the Plover Watch Volunteer Program.

Outstanding Service Award Barbara Burke

The choice of Barbara Burke as a recipient of the Award was a very easy one. She has served in many positions in the chapter since her arrival in the Morro Bay area in 1987. She has always been a person that volunteers to perform any task that needs to be done. Her first position with the chapter was that of Corresponding Secretary during the period 1987-1989. In 1991 she volunteered to be Chairman of the Education Committee. During the three year period till 1994 she was instrumental in increasing the number of teachers that used Audubon Adventures in their classrooms from 15 to 34, an increase of over 100%. In this time frame she also secured a grant from Pacific Gas and Electric to fund the writing and implementation of an educational science program using Sweet Springs as an instructional aid. Immediately after her chairmanship of the Education Committee we find her again at work for the chapter as president elect for the two year period January 1994 to December 1995. She assumed the position of president in January 1996, for a period of 18 months until June of 1997. During this period she was a delegate from the chapter to The Western Regional Audubon Chapter Conference and was instrumental in the

organization of the Central Coast Chapter group. Here she helped in the development of the Central Coast Birding Trail.

Without taking a break she assumed the position of co-chairman of the Morro Bay Winter Bird Festival. She has served in that position continuously since then and has overseen seven very successful festivals. She must have found some spare time beginning in June of 2001 because she volunteered to be co-president of the chapter. She served one year this time, until May of 2002.

Thanks from all of us for all that you have done for the chapter. You are an inspiration to all of us.

Outstanding Service Award Johanna Frawley

Joanna Frawley had been president of the Santa Monica Bay Audubon Society when she moved here in 1984. She wasted no time in becoming active in the Morro Coast Audubon Society. She served as Vice President for two years from May, 1985, then President for two years and Past President for two more. (*cont'd next page*)

During her tenure as President of MCAS in 1987-1989, she served on the Sweet Springs acquisition committee. The path to Audubon Overlook from the parking area was paved. We saw our last rummage sale and our first Support Drive, dubbed by Nancy Vaughan as "Dollars and Sense". The MCAS logo – the Peregrine Falcon head – was developed. The Breeding Bird Atlas was planned and begun. Audubon Adventures was first underwritten by our chapter for the schools. Joanna attended all of the Audubon conferences, always paying her own way.

Later, May, 2001, to April, 2002, she served, as co-President. She has worked as a primary support in the background on many projects over the years.

Joanna has also been a significant figure in the Morro Bay Winter Bird Festival, from its first one in 1997.

We are deeply grateful to Johanna for her service to the chapter.

Audubon Activist Award Marla Morrissey

Marla moved to Los Osos with her son in 1992. They witnessed a Family in a canoe disturb Brant geese near Sweet Springs, resulting in three of the birds being shot (during hunting season). Her first conservation act was to create the original Bird Friendly Boating signs which help boaters become aware of how waterfowl may interpret their recreational activities. (First the waterfowl look-up, then call to each other, then move away - before flying off). Marla got the necessary permits for the signs to be placed at boat ramps.

Marla spent a short time answering the phone for Pacific Wildlife care, before she embarked on creating the Morro Estuary Greenbelt Alliance (MEGA) - a non-profit committed to saving the rare coastal dune habitat of birds, animals, & plants around Morro Bay. MEGA has been in partnership with many groups and preserved over 300 acres.

In 1994, her son Keane, found Steelhead trout in Los Osos Creek, just after the heavy rainfall that year. She lost nearly an acre of her land to erosion from a previous owner's recreational vehicle disturbance of the property. This incident led to the creation of the Steelhead & Stream Coalition of the So. Central California Coast.

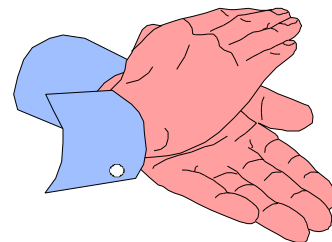
She has worked actively with the Morro Bay National Estuary Program (MBNEP) for 5 years serving as Executive Committee and Implementation Committee Chair in 2000.

In 2000-2001 she joined the MCAS Board as co-conservation chair with Gale Kordowski. She felt Audubon could achieve considerable influence with well-written letters to our elected representatives. Marla, Gale, & Carolina Van Stone created the Photo Essay of the Western Snowy Plover which is currently at Hearst Castle & online at westernsnowyplover.org.

She created the first Tri-County 2001 (SLO, Santa Barbara, & Ventura) Plover forum for the multiple land managers of plover habitat to meet, discuss challenges, needs, and to help each other's management toward plover recovery. Working with USF&WS and Congresswoman Lois Capps. Marla conceived a plan for a Central Coast Plover Watch Volunteer Program & media outreach program & received a \$75,000 grant.

Marla currently represents conservation & Audubon on the Marine Interest Group (MIG), a group of stakeholders trying to protect & enhance marine resources. Although the group initially looked at the option of extending the Monterey Marine Sanctuary, creating a new sanctuary, or remains at status quo. Marla, with MIG facilitator Don Maruska, organized the meeting between several Cal Poly Professors & fishermen. She feels continued networking of existing agencies, researchers, fishermen, and conservationists should continue until a decision about the sanctuary is made.

All of Marla's work has involved the actions to save habitats. Her protective feelings deepened when she started her family and thought of the future her children would like to inherit. We all will benefit from her commitment.

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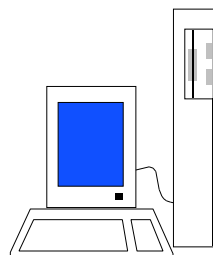

MCAS FIELD TRIP REPORT

Morro Coast Audubon held a field trip near San Simeon Creek and the pines and riparian area east of the campground on August 30th.

At the mouth of the creek we had Green Heron, Red-necked Phalaropes, Semi-palmated Plovers and other usual peeps and gulls. Labor day weekend probably wasn't that conducive to good birding with hordes of people walking from the campground to the beach, some throwing rocks at the birds.

A walk back into the pine trees yielded Pygmy Nuthatch, Brown Creeper, White-breasted Nuthatch (heard only), Steller's Jay, and the expected Chickadees, Bushtits, Scrub Jay, etc. One observation of note was the complete absence of warblers. We couldn't even scare up a Wilson's or Common Yellowthroat in the creek bed.

Out on the grassland we had Red-tailed, and Red-shouldered Hawk, and White-tailed Kite including at least one juvenile.

Walking back between the upper campground and the Washburn Day Use area, we had one of the strangest birds we all had ever seen. At first I thought it was some kind of kingbird, but every feather looked worn and ratty (I first thought it was wet, but I think it was just in very bad shape). The underside was yellowish with black mottling (one of the participants described it as green instead of yellow), the head had a white hooded appearance, and the bill was large and black. Then it called like a Scrub Jay and flew away. It was very odd looking.

BOARD HIGHLIGHTS 8 September 2003

Board members present: Dick Boyd, Laura Brewer, Chris Crescioli,, Jim Havlena , Dave Lawrence, Marla Morrissey, Dick Parker, John Perkins, Ted Pope, David Roark, Mike Stiles, Elaine Townsend, Norma Wightman; Chpt. Adm. Stephnie Wald

Meeting called to order by President Roark. Minutes of the August meeting were approved. The president extended thanks to Dick Parker for chairing the August meeting and to Stephnie for preparing the annual report.

Treasurer's Report The \$25,000 donation announced at the August meeting was noted.

Announcements:

- The Wildlife Society will sponsor a program at the Morro Bay Natural History Museum on Monday, November 24 at 7 p.m. presented by Moose Peterson either on shorebirds or birds of the Central Coast. Audubon members are invited.

Committee Reports:

- **Education**—a new chair is needed. Wendi will continue to help with Audubon Adventures and will transition information on to someone else. **Lands**—the Nancy Vaughan \$500 Scholarship was awarded to Roberta Walker. Sweet Springs has been featured in Los Osos Chamber of Commerce publications. It was moved, seconded, passed (MSP) that \$100 be given to the Chamber from the Sweet Springs fund. The Overlook has extensive shrubbery on the west which blocks the view. A crane is needed to trim that area. Tree service will charge \$3,000 to cut, but not remove the vegetation. Neighbors will pay half the amount. It was MSP to expend \$1,500 on this project. It was suggested that this become a budget line item.
- **Programs**—The scholarship recipient who attended the Maine Audubon Camp has offered to give a program.

- **Publicity**—Several articles have appeared about the scholarship, pelagic trip and general meeting.

Old Business

- **Shade-grown Coffee**--A tasting at San Luis Artist's Gallery during their Art with Heart event on November 15 from 2-5 p.m. was approved. Public education on the benefits of this coffee is needed. **Christmas Bird County Maps**—It was reported that maps will be available online.
- **Fund Raising**—Dick Parker, Jim Havlena and Mary Adams have volunteered to begin the formation of a fund raising committee.
- **Rare Bird Phone System**—Mike Stiles will take over the phone.
- **Planning retreat**—A retreat will be held at Dick Parker's house in Los Osos on Sat., Feb. 28. **Other**—A \$100 contribution was mailed to Kara Hagedorn to cover part of the cost of the permit for her educational hawk, Sunshine. It was suggested she present a program to MCAS.

New Business

- **Audubon Chapter Issues and Opportunities**—A document was shared from the Western Regional Director that will attempt to develop a set of priority issues including the dues share policy that is to be reviewed by mid-2004. The national organization seeks ideas about citizen science, education and advocacy programs.
- **Condor exhibit**—A special photo exhibit of the Condor Recovery Program from the Ventana Wilderness Society will likely be displayed at the Morro Bay Natural History Museum in Jan/Feb. Some support funding may be sought from MCAS to mount the exhibit.

THE BIRDS OF SAN LUIS OBISPO COUNTY – August 2003

- Sooty Shearwater – 18 Aug, an estimated 60,000 passed by Pismo Beach in a half-hour period (AS).
- Ross's Goose – 15 and 26 Aug, the adult summering at Oceano County Park was reported twice during the month (BS, DL). Two adults were present at Laguna Lake all month (mob).
- Lesser Scaup – 15 Aug, a female was present in the Oceano Lagoon (BS).
- Surf Scoter – 3 Aug, 189 off Old Creek in Cayucos was more than expected in mid-summer (TE).
- Lesser Yellowlegs – four were reported during the period with one at the mouth of Pismo Creek on 26 Aug (DL) and up to three in tidal ponds near the Turri Road and South Bay Blvd intersection (AS,TC).
- Wandering Tattler – 27 Aug, three were along the bluffs of Montana de Oro State Park (AS).
- Red Phalarope – 31 Aug, one was in the tidal ponds near the Turri Road and South Bay Blvd intersection (TC).
- Red-necked Phalarope – above average numbers were reported along the coast. Up to 50 were present in the tidal ponds near the Turri Road and South Bay Blvd intersection between 14 -31 Aug (MH,TE,TC), 27 were in the lagoon at Pismo Creek mouth on 14 Aug (DT), and 55 were in the San Geronimo Creek mouth lagoon on 31 Aug (KH).
- Wilson's Phalarope – three were seen along the coast with one in the tidal ponds near the Turri Road and South Bay Blvd intersection on 24 Aug (JR) and two at the mouth of Villa Creek on 31 Aug (TC).
- Ancient Murrelet – 18 Aug, one seen from shore off San Simeon must have been a summering transient as this species rarely arrives from breeding sites before the end of October (MSM).
- Xantus's Murrelet – 18 Aug, although rarely seen from shore, one was seen from San Simeon (MSM)
- Chimney Swift – 15 Aug, one felt to be this species was with Cliff Swallows over the Oceano Lagoon (BS).
- Lucy's Warbler – 29 Aug, one was found in Spooners Cove Campground at MDOSP (AS) for only the seventh SLO County fall record.
- Townsend's Warbler – 1 Aug, a first year / female bird was seen along West Cuesta Ridge (TC) set a new early fall arrival date.
- Tricolored Blackbird – 24 Aug, one was at the Cloisters Pond (JR) where this species bred last year.
- Great-tailed Grackle – 23 Aug, a begging juvenile being fed by a female by the Mustang Water Slides at Lopez Lake was the first confirmation of nesting at the lake (JC). 24 Aug, two females were feeding young at the Cloisters Pond in Morro Bay (JR).
